In the 1950s, the economy was booming. The first half of the century had been hard, punctuated by periods of general poverty and two world wars. But, things had finally taken a turn for the better. People embraced this new world of opportunities.


The coal industry, and many others, underwent a period of rapid growth. People had money to spend. The new generation wanted a lifestyle that reflected their hard-won freedom. A television, for example, was a must-have around this time. A visit to the cinema, or a tour around one of the new departments stores, were a favorite activities.

In Luxembourg, too, people got busy, constructing the architecture that would house the city's growing population and the many new businesses springing up. Work was going on everywhere you looked. From prestige projects like the Theatre of Luxembourg City, which you can still visit today, to residential projects of all shapes and sizes.


It was in 1955, amid these optimistic times, that the Graas family built an industrial complex to host their metalworking business. A modern structure, equipped with large open spaces for their materials and the structures they produced.











There was no need for warm or pleasant touches, outside or inside. Functionality guided the construction. A frame of steal, handsomely proportioned entry doors, and windows partly constructed from glass bricks mark the main hall. The offices, on the first floor, took only enough space as was absolutely necessary, leaving as much volume to the main hall as possible.

In 2012. Steve Krack discovered the Graas building and bought the entire complex, immediately grasping its potential as a hotel. Renovations began in 2017. The new owner carefully selected some key construction materials, setting them aside to become emblematic of the lovingly restored building. The front and rear elevations of the building, for example, have been dressed with bricks reclaimed from the main engineering halls. The red brick accents which catch the eye here and there give new life to the walls of houses demolished in the Province de Luxembourg, in Belgium.





It was clear from the beginning that the planning and permissions would take some time. But Steve Krack judged the building too special to leave it empty.

So, following many discussions, coffees and beers with his friend Silvano Vidale, they decided to create a temporary exhibition space. Inviting 14 architects and designers to each create a pavilion within the main hall, L'Amicale des Amis was born.

The pop-up show, which opened in December 2014, was a great success. The complete creative freedom of the projects, the personality of the 14 creators and diversity of materials they used, accomplished something truly unique.

L'Amicale des Amis was distinguished in 2015 with a Prix honoraire at the Luxembourg Architecture Awards.











THE SPIRHT OF GRAACE

The name Graace is clearly an homage to the former owners, the Graas family, but it also reflects the aesthetic passion of the new proprietor, Steve Krack.

Steve Krack is a self-taught architect and lifestyle property developer. Graace is a perfect embodiment of his approach, his values and his philosophy.




Stepping through the dark, steely gates, an atmosphere of green calm embraces you, gently disconnecting you from the rush and noise of the city.

Breakfast: fresh and tasty fruits, juices; bread, pastries and cakes prepared and provided by local artisans.





















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
